ACCESSIBLE DESIGN

Products and environments are usable by all people, to the greatest extent possible, without the need for adaptation or specialized design.

An inclusive playground considers not just physical equipment, but also emotional, social, and psychological benef ts of play. It encompasses the philosophy that children and adults of all abilities benef t from being able to play and interact together.

Accessible design meets the environmental and communication needs of the functional limitations of people with disability. Accessible design aims to meet minimum ADA requirements to achieve usability.

FIVE OF SEVEN SENSES

Five of our seven senses are important on playgrounds: sight, sound, tactile, vestibular and proprioceptive. (We leave the senses of taste and smell in the cafeteria!)


PROPIOCEPTION
